This supplement implements and extends the guidance of AFI 36-2903, *Dress and Personal Appearance Of Air Force Personnel*, 18 July 2011 and Air and Education and Training Command, 36-2903 Supplement *Dress and Personal Appearance Of Air Force Personnel*, 14 November 2014. This publication does not apply to Air National Guard, but applies to Air Force Reserve Command Units.

Ensure that all records created as a result of processes prescribed in this publication are maintained IAW Air Force Manual (AFMAN) 33-363, Management of Records, and disposed of IAW Air Force Records Information Management System (AFRIMS) Records Disposition Schedule (RDS). Refer recommended changes and questions about this publication to the Office of Primary Responsibility (OPR) using the AF Form 847, *Recommendation for Change of Publication*; route AF Form 847s from the field through the appropriate functional's chain of command. Attachment 1 is a glossary of references and supporting information.

SUMMARY OF CHANGES

This document has been substantially revised and must be completely reviewed. Major changes include, deleted specific uniform style, color, and type that are authorized to be worn by Health and Wellness Center (HAWC) and Services personnel at Keesler AFB. Deleted instructions authorizing cloth nametags. Updated approved "No hats areas". Disposition instructions are included and deleted attachment 6.

1.2.13.1. (Added) Send requests for "no hat areas" to 81 FSS/FSMPS for processing. Approved "no hat areas" are:

1.2.13.1.1. (Added) The fenced in area of the Transportation compound (Bldgs 4430, 4431, 4432, and 4434 respectively).

1.2.13.1.2. (Added) The fenced in area of the Civil Engineer compound (Bldgs 3902, 3903, and 3904, respectively).

1.2.13.1.3. (Added) The fenced in area around the Taylor Logistics Center (Bldg 4002).

1.2.13.1.4. (Added) The Medical Center patio area (behind Bldg 0468).

1.2.13.1.5. (Added) The flight line area (including restricted zone 4) and the areas between Hangar 5 (Bldg 4205), Hangar 4 (Bldg 4204), and Hangar 3 (Bldg 4203). Remove headgear when entering the flight line area. Flight line is defined as the area inside the anti-terrorist fence. Headgear may be worn in the Distinguished Visitor greeting area and to protect the wearer during adverse weather conditions except around operating aircraft engines. Security Forces personnel will wear the beret or other authorized optional headgear at all times unless its wear presents an immediate hazard.

1.6. (Added) The third floor outside observation deck located on Bldg 4332 (Joint Weather Training Complex).

1.7. (Added) The 85 EIS Vehicle Operations/Maintenance Compound.

1.8. (Added) The fenced in areas comprising the Fuels Bulk Storage and Liquid Oxygen Storage (Bldgs 4424 and 4407).

1.4.14. (Added) "Wear of the uniform in the gaming area of casinos is not authorized. EXCEPTION: Members in uniform may walk through the gaming area to get to or from a dining area."

3.7. (Added) The following dress and appearance standards apply in all public areas of Keesler AFB including the hospital, commissary, dining facilities, exchange facilities, and military work areas. These standards do not apply to those seriously injured or sick when seeking medical treatment at a Keesler medical facility. Visitors may be denied access to the base if their personal appearance violates these standards.

3.7.1. (Added) The following standards of dress and appearance are prescribed:

3.7.1.1. (Added) Each individual's body, clothing, and footwear will be reasonably clean and not present a health hazard. Example: Garments which are soiled, perspiration-saturated, or have a strong odor are considered unacceptable and a health hazard inside facilities, gymnasiums excluded.

3.7.1.2. (Added) Upper and lower body will be covered with appropriate outer garments.

3.7.1.3. (Added) Shirts and tops will be of adequate length to cover the waist in dining facilities.

3.7.1.4. (Added) Females will wear appropriate undergarments when wearing see-through or fish-net body garments.

3.7.1.5. (Added) Outer garments will be properly sized, fitted, and fastened to prevent external exposure of undergarments. This does not preclude T-shirts showing at the neck.

3.7.1.6. (Added) The leg openings of shorts will be of adequate fit and coverage to prevent the buttocks, underwear, and internal pockets from being exposed.

3.7.1.7. (Added) Men will not wear sleeveless shirts or tank-tops in dining facilities. Women may wear sun or strap tops if only the shoulders are exposed.

3.7.1.8. (Added) Footwear will cover the bottom of the feet completely and be in good repair to avoid being a safety hazard. Example: Proper fitting shower shoes are acceptable if they cover the bottom of the feet.

3.7.2. (Added) The following practices of dress and appearance are prohibited:

3.7.2.1. (Added) Bare feet, except where footwear is inappropriate such as swimming pools, playgrounds, or certain areas of gymnasiums.

3.7.2.2. (Added) Clothing with obscene print, profanity, lewd words or drawings.

3.7.2.3. (Added) Clothing items with styles or accouterments which support a country, organization, or any individual who supports or has supported the overthrow of the government of the United States.

3.7.2.4. (Added) Any unsanitary dress or grooming practice.

3.7.2.5. (Added) Appearing in public areas without shirts or blouses. This does not apply to recreational areas where it may be appropriate for men to remove their shirts.

3.7.2.6. (Added) The wear of headgear in dining facilities/snack bars.

3.7.2.7. (Added) The wear of personal listening devices, headphones/earbuds while in order line/cashier area of dining facilities and non-prior service dormitory charge of quarters areas.

3.7.2.8. (Added) The use of cellular phones while in order line/cashier area of dining facilities and non-prior service dormitory charge of quarters areas.

3.7.2.9. (Added) The wear of sunglasses in dining facilities and non-prior service dormitory charge of quarters areas.

3.7.2.10. (Added) The mixing of civilian clothing with distinctive uniform items. Distinctive uniform items are those items unique to the uniform such as grade insignia, cap devices, badges and insignia, buttons with the Air Force Coat of Arms, and so forth.

5.1.3. Cloth or silk screen unit designation emblems on Airman Battle Uniform (ABU) undershirts are NOT authorized.

6.1.10. The Sage Green Fleece is authorized to be worn indoors by all members.

6.2.7. The Black Watch Cap is authorized to be worn with authorized outer garments, para 6.1, and the physical training uniform (PTU) and improved physical training uniform (IPTU).

6.2.8. The Sage Green Watch Cap is authorized to be worn with authorized ABU outer garments and the physical training uniform (PTU) and improved physical training uniform (IPTU).

6.3.2. Sports straps, chains, and cords will not be attached to glasses while in garrison. Straps, chains, and cords will be allowed for safety reasons IAW AFI 91-203.

6.5.2.1. Cloth or silk screen unit designation emblems on Airman Battle Uniform (ABU) undershirts are NOT authorized.

7.1.7.1. When wearing the physical training uniform PTU or improved physical training uniform (IPTU) and participating in both organized and individual physical training, members are authorized and may elect to wear a “solid black or dark blue baseball/sport cap with the Air Force symbol or U.S. Air Force printed/embroidered on the front.” Caps will only be worn outdoors.

9.6.1.1.2. (Added) 81st Security Forces entry controllers and their supervisors assigned to the 81st Security Forces Gate Section (81 SFS/S3OG) are authorized to wear any components of the Security Forces dress uniform.
