This instruction implements AFPD 38-1, *Manpower and Organization*, policies and procedures for operations within the assigned air defense region. It defines the personnel status individuals must be in when performing the Federal mission. It also defines those events involving a Federal mission that will activate the Eleventh Air Force (11 AF) Commander's (CC) delegated authority to order a member of the Air National Guard (ANG) to active duty under Title 10 United States Code Section 12301(d), *Reserve Components Generally*. The procedures specified in this instruction must be followed on a day-to-day basis. This instruction applies to all personnel assigned to the 176th Air Defense Squadron (176 ADS), Alaska ANG as the implementation of written agreement between 11 AF and the Alaska Governor. Refer recommended changes and questions about this publication to the Office of Primary Responsibility (OPR) using the AF Form 847, *Recommendation for Change of Publication*. Route the AF Form 847 through the appropriate chain of command. Ensure all records created as a result of processes prescribed in this publication are maintained in accordance with Air Force Instruction (AFI) 33-322, *Records Management and Information Governance Program*, and disposed of in accordance with Air Force Records Information Management System Records Disposition Schedule.

SUMMARY OF CHANGES

This document has been revised and must be completely reviewed.

1. Mission of 11 AF Headquarters (HQ). 11 AF plans, conducts, controls, and coordinates air operations in accordance with the tasks assigned by the Pacific Air Forces (PACAF)/CC, and is the force provider for Alaskan Command, the Alaskan North American Aerospace Defense Command Region (ANR), and other unified commanders. This mission is accomplished largely through the 611th Air Operations Center (611 AOC) and the PACAF Regional Support Center. Together they provide a network of critical air surveillance and command, control, and communication functions necessary to perform tactical warning and attack assessment in defense of Alaska, and activities necessary for the defense of National Command Authority (NCA) designated critical infrastructure within the State of Alaska.

2. Structure of 11 AF.

- 2.1. HQ 11 AF and the 611 AOC are U.S. Air Force organizations gained by PACAF.
- 2.2. The “176 ADS ANG United States (ANGUS)” is the 176 ADS (ANG) as U.S. Air Force organization when activated to Title 10 status.
- 2.3. The 176 ADS (ANG) is an Alaska ANG state organization in Title 32 status which supports 611 AOC operations.

3. Personnel/Duty Status.

- 3.1. HQ 11 AF and 611 AOC. All military personnel assigned to HQ 11 AF and 611 AOC are in active duty Title 10 status. There are no Title 32 status ANG personnel assigned. The commander of the 611 AOC will provide the federal mission link between the 176 ADS (ANG), 611 AOC, and 11 AF.
- 3.2. The 176 ADS (ANG). All military personnel assigned to the 176 ADS (ANG), including the commander, are in Title 32 status until the initiation of an Air Sovereignty Event (ASE) defined in [paragraph 4.3](#).
 - 3.2.1. When an ASE is declared, those personnel involved in the ASE, regardless of location, are instantaneously recalled to Title 10 status pursuant to their self-executing orders and 10 U.S.C. §12301(d).
 - 3.2.2. Upon activation to Title 10 status, such personnel are assigned to the 176 ADS (ANGUS) and become subject to federal Title 10 command authority.
 - 3.2.3. At the termination of the ASE, personnel immediately revert to their appropriate Title 32 status in the 176 ADS (ANG).
- 3.3. As a condition of their employment, all 176 ADS (ANG) personnel are required to execute an individual voluntary consent statement which sets forth their consent to be recalled to Title 10 duty status pursuant to 10 U.S.C § 12301(d) and paragraph section 3.2., this instruction.

4. Events Involving a Federal Mission.

- 4.1. The Secretary of the Air Force has authority under 10 U.S.C. § 12301(d) to activate ANG members to federal active duty, with the consent of the member, and the Governor of Alaska. This authority has been delegated to 11 AF/CC.

4.2. The 11 AF/CC authorizes instantaneous voluntary activation of ANG members upon a declaration of an ASE. The 11 AF/CC may declare an ASE and has delegated this authority to 11 AF/Vice Commander (CV), ANR/Director of Operations (DO) (611 AOC/CC), and 611 AOC/CV.

4.3. An ASE is defined as any event that requires a tactical action decision for the North American Aerospace Defense Command (NORAD) mission as defined in the Operation NOBLE EAGLE (ONE) Execution Order (EXORD). An ASE also includes any activity in direct support of the NORAD mission and activities necessary for the defense of NCA-designated critical infrastructure within the State of Alaska.

4.4. An ASE typically begins and ends at:

4.4.1. Declared or named NORTHERN SOVEREIGNTY Operations until terminated.

4.4.2. An active air scramble order for Operation NOBLE EAGLE events until all aircraft have landed.

4.4.3. First aircraft take off during Temporary Flight Restriction (TFR) operations until all aircraft have landed.

4.4.4. When otherwise declared by an appropriate authority from [paragraph 4.2](#), such as during atypical surveillance and identification missions, or counter-drug missions.

4.5. All 176 ADS (ANG) personnel who participate in an ASE, including those who provide direct operational support and/or supervision of the event, are participating in the Federal mission of aerospace warning and control and upon declaration of the ASE are instantaneously recalled to Title 10 status.

4.5.1. The physical location of personnel involved in ASE is not a controlling factor in their instantaneous activation to Title 10 status.

4.5.2. Those personnel who are involved in an ASE and who are relieved from duty at the end of a shift during an ASE immediately revert to Title 32 status.
